<u>Red Herrings and Dead Ends</u>

Thursdays, 10:30 - noon, in the Halpern Room

October 18 - <u>Mystery stories inspired by a mother and grandfather</u> who were war-time spies.

Iona Wishaw has lived in several countries but now lives in Vancouver. She is a bestselling author who is delighted to speak about the origins for her characters. Though her plots are fictional, her characters not so much. Her family photos and anecdotes bring an immediacy to this post WW II period.

November 1 - The Gothic story and Our Addiction to Crime Fiction

Dr. John Whatley is an academic Program Director at the Centre for Online and Distance Education at SFU and an Associate Member of the Department of English and Criminology. He will explore our obsession with crime fiction by seeking its roots in Gothic literature. Beginning with readings from 18th century Gothic stories and continuing with Sherlock Holmes, Hercule Poirot and Detective Chief Inspector Morse.

November 8 - <u>Where to go from Poe?</u> <u>Answer: In detective fiction, everywhere</u>

Dr. Pat Merival will discuss how Poe's Dupin stories kicked off the "Armchair Detectives" such as Holmes and Poirot while his lesser known "Man of the Crowd" may be the earliest example of the "Urban Gumshoe" novels of Chandler, Hammet and others. Pat taught English and Comparative Literature for almost 40 years at UBC, wrote a book on Pan the Goat-God and co-edited a volume on the metaphysical detective story.

November 15 - <u>A Reader's Approach to the Mystery Novel</u>

Ann Lawrence of *Lawrence Books* and **Walter and Jill Sinclair** of *White Dwarf/Dead Write Books*, as booksellers, have insight into what mystery readers enjoy and experience. They will discuss some of the current mystery authors, themes and varieties of the genre.

November 29 - Film: Heavenly Creatures *9:30 - noon*

Jennifer Wade will introduce the film which portrays the startling childhood of murder mystery writer Anne Perry. Jennifer is a UBC English Professor Emeritus and award-winning author, and has received many awards for her many acts of giving and support of those who cannot speak for themselves. Please note the change in time for this lecture.

December 6 - The Best of Scandinavian Crime Thrillers & Authors

Lena Karlström teaches Swedish language courses, and Scandinavian literature courses including the summer course in Scandinavian Drama and Film at UBC. Currently she is focusing on her exciting new Scandinavian crime writing course!

December 13 - YouTube video: The Strange Case of Dr. Doyle

The book (in the Society library) by Drs Eugene and Daniel Friedman, gives persuasive evidence that Conan Doyle, the famed author of Sherlock Holmes was actually "Jack the Ripper". The video will be followed by a hilarious group game of solving "Two Minute Mystery Stories". How good are you at sleuthing? **There will be prizes for the winners, with tea and cookies to follow.**




Dr. Stan Markotich "Shakespeare in Eastern Europe"

The workshop seemed to slow down in August and September because many of the regular woodworkers were on holidays visiting with grandchildren. Despite the slowdown the volunteers still completed many projects arising from the Summer Craft Market. These custom projects included crafting of dulcimers; constructing yellow cedar benches; fashioning light weight traditional English style cloth beach chairs; assembling small TV stands to raise the sets higher; creating luggage racks; cutting wooden key holders; building custom picture frames; turning bowls; fabricating looms; and making heritage pens. Several women members have recently toured the shop and taken the workshop orientation session that allows them to use the power sanders and bandsaws in order facilitate the effort on a variety of interesting wooden craft projects. One of these ladies remarked that the machines made the work so much faster and enjoyable because they gave her the time to be creative instead of struggling to cut the wood by hand.


Tour to the Royal BC Museum to see this amazing exhibit




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Brock House Chess Club

She called it 'BESSY', who lived in the old barn behind the Koffee Port.

Sharing the barn with Bessy, was Jerry Janes's beautiful blue Harvard named 'HONEYSUCKLE' . . . Big Jerry was an ex BC Lions player, now a successful businessman and owner of Grabber Screws, whose packing box motto was 'GET SCREWED'. He was a very generous guy, and began accumulating a vast collection of vintage WW-2 aircraft. The Harvard, Chipmunk, Twin Beech, Mustang, Mitchell Bomber, Sabre Jet, Trojan, what-ever.
