### **Electoral Reform Referendum:** The Choices Explained

#### Tuesday, November 6, 1:30-3:30 **Halpern Room**

The Study Group on Democratic Reform is presenting its third and final session on the upcoming Referendum. This time the focus will be on answering members' questions about the different types of voting systems presented on the ballot. The session is offered particularly for members who had to be turned away from the October 1 workshop, but also for those who attended the workshop but still have questions, and for others who want more information about the options.

Once again we are fortunate to have **Shoni Field**, a member of the 2004 B.C. Citizens' Assembly, who will share her considerable expertise with us. Following a presentation on the differences among the three possible proportional systems (DMP, MMP, RUP,) Shoni will open up the floor to questions. What else do we need to know before we vote? What have we heard that has us wondering: is it fact or is it fiction?

Ballots will be delivered starting October 22 and must be mailed in by the end of November. Mail in your ballot after attending this event!


### November 7 Social Isolation and Loneliness & Seniors



Eddy Elmer is a member of the Seniors' Advisory Committee of the City of Vancouver and a PhD student in gerontology at Vrije University of Amsterdam. He will speak about his research in this field. Reference may be made to his newly released report on these issues, including recommendations which could be implemented by government service providers, and individual citizens, to help prevent, or reduce, social isolation and loneliness.

### November 14 Forbidden Food

*Dr. John Sloan* has an unorthodox view on diet and says that whatever the reason is for modern healthy food beliefs, the plain truth is that we are deluded if we expect to live longer or suffer less illness through buying into them. Five decades of science attempting to prove the opposite has failed. The only bad food, for us, is food that tastes bad, or more generally food that doesn't give us inner joy or delight. Enjoy food. # Congratulations to Jennifer Wade, OBC 2018 recipient of The Civic Merit Award

The Civic Merit Award recognizes individuals for outstanding achievement in a particular field of endeavour in sports, science, arts, or culture within the city and the province, or in recognition of a specific service.

City Council must vote unanimously to honour someone with the Civic Merit Award. The City began awarding the Civic Merit Award in 1942.

Jennifer Wade has spent most of her life championing human rights issues around the world. As a founding member of Amnesty International in Vancouver in 1974, she has worked tirelessly on behalf of prisoners of conscience and other people facing injustices throughout the world. Ms. Wade, a retired university teacher, has served on the local and national boards of the Elizabeth Fry Society and on the

boards of other organizations dedicated to human rights, justice issues and those who are disadvantaged in society. She has also created a number of funds to provide scholarships and bursaries for students who have undergone great difficulties or students who are the first in their families to study in B.C. at the post-secondary level. She has also established two scholarships in the Maritimes.

Ms. Wade is the recipient of several prestigious awards including the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal, the Sovereign's Medal, the Renate Shearer Award, and the BC Civil Liberties Reg Robson Award. She has received an honorary doctorate from the University of New Brunswick and an honorary doctor of laws from the University of Vancouver Island. She is a recipient of the Order of British Columbia.

### **November 1 - The Gothic story and Our Addiction to Crime Fiction**

**Dr. John Whatley** is an academic Program Director at the Centre for Online and Distance Education at SFU and an Associate Member of the Department of English and Criminology. He will explore our obsession with crime fiction by seeking its roots in Gothic literature. Beginning with readings from 18th century Gothic stories and continuing with Sherlock Holmes, Hercule Poirot and Detective Chief Inspector Morse.

### November 8 - Where to go from Poe? Answer: In detective fiction, everywhere

**Dr. Pat Merival** will discuss how Poe's Dupin stories kicked off the "Armchair Detectives" such as Holmes and Poirot while his lesser known "Man of the Crowd" may be the earliest example of the "Urban Gumshoe" novels of Chandler, Hammet and others. Pat taught English and Comparative Literature for almost 40 years at UBC, wrote a book on Pan the Goat-God and co-edited a volume on the metaphysical detective story.

### **November 15 - A Reader's Approach to the Mystery Novel**

**Ann Lawrence** of *Lawrence Books* and **Walter and Jill Sinclair** of *White Dwarf/Dead Write Books*, as booksellers, have insight into what mystery readers enjoy and experience. They will discuss some of the current mystery authors, themes and varieties of the genre.

### November 29 - Film: Heavenly Creatures \*9:30 - noon\*

**Jennifer Wade** will introduce the film which portrays the startling childhood of murder mystery writer Anne Perry. Jennifer is a UBC English Professor Emeritus and award-winning author, and has received many awards for her many acts of giving and support of those who cannot speak for themselves. Please note the change in time for this lecture.

### **December 6 - The Best of Scandinavian Crime Thrillers & Authors**

**Lena Kariström** teaches Swedish language courses, and Scandinavian literature courses including the summer course in Scandinavian Drama and Film at UBC. Currently she is focusing on her exciting new Scandinavian crime writing course!

### December 13 - YouTube video: The Strange Case of Dr. Doyle

The book (in the Society library) by Drs Eugene and Daniel Friedman, gives persuasive evidence that Conan Doyle, the famed author of Sherlock Holmes was actually "Jack the Ripper". The video will be followed by a hilarious group game of solving "Two Minute Mystery Stories". ### **Brock House Woodworkers**

Some of the other standouts in preparation include heritage wooden pens turned by Zig, David and Susan. These pens are made by turning wood casings until they are less than 2 millimetres thick then polishing them to give a high gloss that enhances the natural woodgrain. If you are looking for a special Christmas gift you can even ask to have a custom pen turned from some wood that has a special memory for you so that it comes to mind every time that the pen is used.

In case you missed the last year's strumstiks, Steve has designed an entirely new but elegant stringed instrument that looks and sounds like the work of a professional luthier. Allen is crafting a special rocking horse that will likely sell out at the beginning of the fair. Give us this day that we may see the beauty before our eyes. Give us this day that we may cherish the earth before it dies."




