From the President's Pen

Just like the waiting period required for a positive change in the weather, I ask you to place trust in the fact that better times will be coming again soon, just like the return of the much anticipated sunny and warm days of Spring.




March 12 *10:30 a.m.* "The Right to Write: Whose Story Is It & Who Can Write It?" With Esmeralda Cabral.





This heartfelt memoir, with simple illustrations, tells us the story of a young girl's early childhood in rural Estonia before she was forced to flee her country after the events of WWII. Honest and down-to-earth, the narrative captures a child's perspective of both the simple joy of living off the land and the incomprehensible horror of being torn apart by a conflict she could not understand. Ms. Bardell is now a visual artist living in Vancouver, she has had the honour of being invited to show her abstract work in the Estonian Art in Exile exhibition at the National Museum of Art (KUMU).

Workshop News

Like the seasons the workshop seems to cycle through periods with high and low activities. Just before Christmas the shop thrummed as various woodworkers finished presents and projects. Then it seemed to slow down as woodworkers drifted away for holidays and seemed to stay slow until well past new year, but it was all an illusion. When I look back at the attendance record there were several people that visited the shop each day over the last two months and people took the time to be creative.

Bob finished the large cedar box that he made for his daughter, Jan made laminated serving boards, Robin made a bench, Wally used a scroll saw to craft tree ornaments, Steve made live edge cutting boards, David made a unique cribbage board, Bill assembled a large urn that looks like a cookie jar, Alan made a freestanding shelf for shoes, repaired a chair and started a TV table, Barry made a wooden Union Jack and helped Bill construct more looms for a Salish weaving class. Susan constructed two gorgeous cutting boards from many small strips arranged in many, many colours. Don repaired a table and a large chair. The other Steve repaired a harp, built a bird house modelled on the Hastings Mill and finished a carved jewelry box. Chris reinstalled the storage cabinets in the renovated part of the workshop, Ray painted the walls and ceilings. Jan installed a thickness sander to simplify finishing. We also had several workshop orientations to give new Brock House members the background to work in the workshop.

One instructor fell overboard whilst checking the top wing gas tank, and parachuted down. His new student had to fend for himself, and amazingly managed to land back at the field.


It was about six weeks before they got a week-end pass to go home to visit their parents.

VPD warns public about recent thefts



Vancouver – Vancouver Police are alerting the public about recent thefts that are believed to be part of an organized crime "distraction theft" group targeting the elderly.

"There have been multiple thefts reported in the past few weeks," says Constable Tania Visintin, VPD. "The thief distracts the victim, prior to stealing from them. We have issued warnings in the past, but with the recent cases, are again encouraging residents to be aware and report suspicious activity."

Police believe multiple suspects are involved. Victims report being approached by a female suspect who makes physical contact through a handshake or a hug. The suspect places fake jewelry on the victim and removes expensive jewelry. The getaway vehicle is usually driven by a male and, in some reports, children have also been in the vehicle or have been used to create a distraction.

In other cases, victims report being stopped near a highway where the suspects claims a family member is in need, and offers expensive-looking jewelry as collateral for financial assistance.

"We're advising people to not allow strangers into their personal space, and to tell anyone who tries to give them jewelry or place jewelry on them, that they are not interested," adds Constable Visintin. "If you have fallen victim to this crime, please call police."




